


% Boosters - by County

In Multnomah County, there are 176,569 people ages 18 years and older who are eligible to receive their booster but haven't yet.

Get Boosted!

 Data show that an mRNA booster increases the immune response, which improves protection against getting a serious COVID-19 infection.



Breakthrough Cases - April 2022

During the month of April 2022, there were 18,608 cases of COVID-19 reported to OHA. Of these, 8,815 (47.4%) were unvaccinated, 9,769 (52.5%) were vaccine breakthrough cases, and 24 (0.1%) had an unknown vaccination status. Of all vaccine breakthrough cases in April, 6,142 (62.9%) were fully vaccinated and boosted. The median age of all vaccine breakthrough cases was 46 years. There were 70 (0.7%) breakthrough cases among residents of care facilities, senior living communities or other congregate living **settings. There were 1904 (19.5%)** cases in persons 65 or older. There were 450 (4.6%) cases aged 12-17.

Know Your COVID-19 Community Level

Community Transmission & Masking

OHA strongly recommends that:

- All individuals that wish to wear a mask continue to do so.
- All people in Oregon support the right of other individuals to choose whether and when to wear a mask.
- Individuals continue to wear a mask when on public transportation, in ride-sharing services, on airplanes and in transportation hubs such as airports.
- Individuals review the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Community Levels to understand the rate of COVID-19 transmission in their community.
- Individuals who live in communities with high transmission*
 continue to wear a mask or face covering when in indoor public
 places, including in schools and other community settings.
 - * Multnomah County is medium.

Recommended actions based on current level

Stay <u>up to date</u> with COVID-19 vaccines. <u>Get tested</u> if you have symptoms. Wear a mask if you have symptoms, a positive test, or exposure to someone with COVID-19. Wear a mask on <u>public transportation</u>. You may choose to wear a mask at any time as an additional precaution to protect yourself and others. If you are at <u>high risk for severe illness</u>, consider wearing a mask indoors in public and taking <u>additional precautions</u>.

Community Transmission Levels - Prevention

What Prevention Steps Should You Take Based on Your COVID-19 Community Level?

People may choose to mask at any time. People with <u>symptoms</u>, <u>a positive test</u>, <u>or exposure</u> to someone with COVID-19 should wear a mask. Masks are recommended in indoor public transportation settings and may be required in other places by local or state authorities.

COVID-19 Symptoms? Get Tested.

Symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure to the virus. People with these symptoms may have COVID-19:

- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea
